There have been no changes since the last report. Airspace across most Gulf countries is reopening on a restricted basis. While some countries remain closed, most have resumed limited operations with fewer flights. As a result, crew changes may be possible in certain locations but remain constrained and subject to local conditions. Ruweis PPA ISPS Level 2 All other ports ISPS 1	Open - Limited	Limited airport operations across the country.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Fujairah and Khor Fakkan - The Fujairah Oil Tanker Terminal (FOTT) is partially operational, according to the latest update from the port. Not all berths are online.</li> <li>Vopak terminals have suspended operations at their SPM until further notice.</li> <li>ADNOC SPM Terminal is operational.</li> <li>General cargo and container discharge operations are proceeding as scheduled at both Fujairah Terminal and Khor Fakkan Terminal without any disruption. Anchorage services are all normal without interruption.</li> <li>Navigational warning No. 01/2026 has been disseminated, addressing reported incidents of intermittent GPS signal spoofing and jamming in offshore areas of Fujairah. These disruptions may lead to a loss of positional accuracy, erratic vessel movements on Electronic Chart Display and Information Systems (ECDIS), and potentially misleading positional information. Mariners are advised to consider this area as high risk.</li> <li>Jebel Ali, Hamriya, and Sharjah Port, all terminal port operations are normal.</li> <li>Ruweis and Abu Dhabi petroleum ports are operational. Ruweis PPA (ISPS level 2) &amp; Abu Dhabi Ports (ISPS Level 1). Abu Dhabi Ports confirmed that all UAE ports managed and operated by AD ports remain fully open and are operating as usual.</li> <li>Ras Al Khaimah Ports remain open and are operating normally.</li> <li>Dubai Airports has partially resumed flights to and from Dubai International Airport (DXB) on selected routes. Passengers are advised to check directly with their airline for the latest flight information.</li> <li>Limited airport operations have resumed across the country with a small number of flights operating. Passengers must not travel to the airport unless they have received a confirmed departure time directly from their airline, as schedules remain subject to change.</li> <li>A temporary measure has been implemented to facilitate customs cargo clearance for shipments destined for Jebel Ali or Abu Dhabi Ports via the Ports of Fujairah and Khor Fakkan. In response to ongoing circumstances, this initiative allows direct road transport of containers to Jebel Ali, designated Free Zones, or Abu Dhabi, eliminating the need to adhere to traditional customs clearance procedures.</li> </ul>	24/03/2026 - 08:00

Open	Airspace is open; however, some airlines have cancelled their flights, impacting crew change arrangements.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Current Status: No alerts/notifications have been issued by the local authorities.</li> <li>Ports working normally: Port of Salalah (CT and GCT), Port of Sohar, Port Sultan Qaboos, Muscat, Mina Al Fahal, Qalhat LNG Terminal - Sur, OMIFCO Terminal - Sur, Port of Duqm, Asyad Drydock - Duqm.</li> <li>Vessels calling the Port of Duqm must submit an official letter stating that they are not carrying any dangerous Goods on board. If any dangerous Goods are found, the type of cargo must be specified in detail, and the vessel must await the Ministry's approval before entering Omani territorial waters.</li> <li>The Following notification was received from the Mina Al Fahal terminal (Crude Oil) loading facility. All vessels scheduled to call at MAF are to ensure their Doppler log is fully operational. This precaution is necessary due to ongoing GPS interference in the area. Vessels without a functioning Doppler log cannot be berthed due to safety requirements.</li> <li>Qalhat LNG terminal, Sur and Mina Al Fahal, Muscat, ISPS Level 3 as a precautionary measure. Port of Salalah has changed ISPS Level 2 as a precautionary measure. All other ports ISPS Level 1</li> <li>Airspace remains open, although some international flight routes have been suspended.</li> </ul>	24/03/2026 - 08:00

Qatar	Most ports are operational with some restrictions, apart from Al Shaheen Terminal and Halul Island Terminal ISPS 1	Temporarily Closed	Hamad International Airport has resumed a small number of flights.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Hamad Port, Doha Port, Al Ruweis Port - Ports are operational; however, activity levels are lower than pre-conflict. Al Ruweis Port is restricted to small craft only, including dhows and barges.</li> <li>Mesaieed Port and Ras Laffan Port - Port operations ongoing. Qatar Energy has ceased production of LNG and associated products.</li> <li>QatarEnergy confirmed that Ras Laffan Industrial City was subject to missile attacks on the evening of 18 March. No operational alerts/circulars have been received from the respective ports, hence ISPS remains at level 1 - the port remains operational but with reduced vessel activity.</li> <li>Al Shaheen Terminal and Halul Island Terminal - Operations suspended until further notice.</li> <li>The official security status remains at Security Level 1. However, as a proactive measure, all vessels are requested to exercise heightened caution and vigilance.</li> <li>The Ministry of Transport has advised that, to maintain supply chain continuity, shipping lines may route raw materials and consumer goods destined for Hamad Port via designated alternative ports in Oman and the UAE, with maritime agencies required to coordinate with the relevant port authorities and notify the Ministry accordingly. First Alternative: Sohar, Salalah, and Duqm Port. Second Alternative - Fujairah and Khorfakkan Port.</li> <li>Mwani Qatar (Hamad &amp; Ruweis Ports) activates Exceptional Package of Port Tariff Facilities in response to exceptional circumstances that are disrupting supply chains and creating operational and logistical challenges. The decision remains in effect throughout the exceptional phase, until further notice.</li> <li>Limited number of flights operating from Hamad International Airport starting 18 March 2026. All flights are currently operating through an authorised limited corridor approved by the Qatar Civil Aviation Authority and other relevant authorities, who continue to oversee all decisions regarding airspace operations. These flights do not indicate a resumption of normal operations. The temporary closure of Qatari airspace remains in effect due to the current situation in the region.</li> </ul>	24/03/2026 - 08:00

Authorities continue to issue general public awareness guidelines purely as precautionary measures. There are no security incidents inside Jordan.</li> <li>All operations remain normal at Aqaba Port. Terminals, marine services, cargo handling, and gate operations are functioning without disruption. Maritime navigation and cargo operations are proceeding smoothly and without delay.</li> <li>Royal Jordanian and the Jordanian airspace remain open, flights to Qatar, UAE, Syria, Bahrain and Kuwait remain closed.</li> </ul>	23/03/2026 - 17:00

Israel	Fully operational ISPS 1	Open / Restricted	No crew change possible	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Eilat, Ashkelon, Ashdod, Hedera and Haifa are fully open for business and functioning at full capacity.</li> <li>RORO car deliveries: Only direct delivery allowed at this stage. No storage at ports is allowed until further notice.</li> <li>No ship has left Israel or was forced to leave outside its schedule.</li> <li>Airspace is now open but restricted. Flights are coming in and out of Israel on a limited basis, with restrictions.</li> <li>A briefing update from the Israeli Navy was received relating to operations in Israel. Key points: In order to maintain maritime security, a temporary safety zone has been established along the Israeli coast. In coordination with the Israeli Ministry of Transport, the following temporary measures have been introduced to maintain both the safety of the naval operational activity and freedom of navigation: Vessels with a scheduled port call within 24 hours may remain in the designated anchorage area. Vessels scheduled to arrive in more than 24 hours are required to remain 12-18 nautical miles offshore from the coastline, preferably south of the latitude of Mount Carmel. Vessels carrying DG must obtain berthing approval in advance from the Israeli Navy and the Ports and Shipping Authority. AIS systems - it is recommended to switch off the system after entering the Israeli EEZ in order to prevent civil surveillance from online tracking sites. Communication may be established via marine VHF radio / telephone / satellite phone, if required, with the RCC (Rescue Coordination Center) or the naval authorities. Any changes in the maritime security situation will be communicated through subsequent maritime safety notices.</li> </ul>	23/03/2026 - 17:00
